1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

1. Introductory Note- Chhattisgarh started a fresh journey on the path of progress and as a result, education in general and higher education in particular came to limelight. Government focused on establishing new institutions and improving the physical infrastructure in the existing institutions. Remarkably this college is situated in a rural area having the majority of SCs and OBCs. It has also the privilege of having female students in majority. It also serves as an examination centre of a large number of private students also. No doubt, this college is destined to play a greater role in guiding and shaping the career of lot of local rural youth who may be trained to serve the local community and the mushrooming population of metropolitan city of Raipur. At the onset, the college had no personal building and was to run from a higher secondary school. However, in 2009 it was shifted to a newly constructed double storey building. Soon two class rooms, a seminar hall and a chemistry lab were built by extending the existing building. We were again very fortunate to add a new building with six classrooms in this session. Last year this college celebrated silver jubilee year. What is needed utmost is to take it to a new height of learning, knowledge and skill with ethically sound social value.

- Good physical infrastructure with a campus of 16 acre land and situated along the state highway, provides it an edge. Clean and green campus with good physical infrastructure and healthy academic environment.
- Very active and functional NSS and Red Cross Society.
- Facilities for students like potable drinking water cooler, separate toilet facilities for the girl and male students, computer and internet facilities.
- The library is automated with library management software and is the member of N-List consortium. It has a good collection of competitive books.

- Poor teacher- pupil ratio.
- Student's affinity to rural background and remote area, their poor academic quality at the admission level and last but not the least, their lack of high aspiration and professionalism.
- Attraction of good students towards professional courses reduces the quality during admission.
- Insufficiency of modern teaching gadgets and ICT facilities.
- Insufficient teaching staff, lab technician and office staffs.
- Lack of hostel, staff quarter, auditorium, gymnasium and guest room.
- Deficiency in good track and field infrastructure.

- Having the prestige of being government college of New Raipur area which is the capital of Chhattisgarh.
- Well recognized and well established college of this locality.
- Offering all streams at graduation level.
- Potential of offering PG courses in various subjects of science, social science and commerce.

- Proximity of Raipur providing availability of good resource persons of all discipline.
- Possibility of collaboration with different institutions.
- Possibility to start more vocational and job oriented courses.

- Fulfilling various teaching, non- teaching and administrative needs of the ever increasing number of students with limited number of personnel and resources.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The College follows the prescribed syllabus of Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur (Chhattisgarh). Well designed time table is followed for its implementation. The teaching plan is regularly monitored by the principal of the institution and it is given top most priority to complete the syllabus on time. With the establishment of computer lab and setting up of smart class teachers are using this media for teaching with lot of enthusiasm. Being a rural based college, the new method of teaching with the use of ICT is exciting for students as well. ICT is used for classroom teaching, presentation by students, showing career related academic as well as motivational lectures, showing practical demonstration etc. This year a special program called 'life skill' is introduced and periods are assigned in the time table. The college takes feedback every year from the students and a report of recommendation is prepared and uploaded in the website. This year it is planned to send the feedback received from the students regarding syllabus will be sent to the University for their reference.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The admission process is completely transparent as students take online admission where the whole process of admission is controlled by the higher education department. The reservation policy is applied with utmost care. Being a rural based college the students are more from the nearby villages, still some students from nearby city Raipur are taking admission in the college can be seen now. The teachers of the college tries to bridge the knowledge gap of the advance and slow learner students by simplifying topic and guiding specially to slow learners. Hand notes, internet materials and reference books are also provided. A digital English lab has been established in this session. To enhancing effective learning, students are encouraged to participate in various activities conducted by the departments like debate, group discussion, seminar, projects as well as various extracurricular activities. Project making and PPT presentation with the help of internet is a new practice. Now the facility of E -library is also available for the students. Teachers of various subjects use some innovative practice to teach their students. The college follows the academic calendar for the internal evaluation of the students. Record of each student appearing in the exam is kept formally by the concerned subject teacher. Examination related grievance is resolved on the basis of facts. Smart class rooms are used by the faculties to make teaching and learning interesting.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institution has made all the stakeholders aware of code of ethics to ensure no malpractice and plagiarism in research work and its publication. Mainly graduation level teaching is offered in this college but all faculties except one have doctoral degree. One faculty has got UGC fellowship (JRF and SRF). Two national seminars

and a workshop have been organized by this college. One of the seminars was interdisciplinary where both chemistry and botany was involved. Teachers of the institutions regularly attend seminars and workshops and contribute their research papers.

The institution have made collaboration with NGO's who are interested to work for the improvement of students focusing on academic as well as personality development. The NGO **J.C.I** have already organized five days workshop on personality development in the college with whom M.O.U will be done in March as per their policy. The process for more M.O.U's is under process which is expected to be finalized soon.

The institutions have conducted one day workshop on "Intellectual Property Rights Awareness" where teachers from other institutions also attended other then the faculty and students of the college. The resource person was a senior scientist from CGCOST.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

At present there are 16 classrooms, 8 laboratories, 1 computer room, 2 rooms fitted with smart board, an English language lab, 1 examination cell, 1 staff room, 1 principal's room, 2 office rooms, 1 girl's common, 7 washrooms, 1 play ground and 2 vehicle stands. The library contains sufficient books, subscribes a few magazines, journals and newspapers. Automation of library and provision of wi fi facility, e library facility and a reading hall are other features. There is a large field where field and track events and outdoor games are held. ICT facilities of the college include 30 computers in the computer room with internet facility. Two rooms are fitted with smart boards and there is an English language lab also. Building of the campus is maintained regularly by PWD.

Student Support and Progression

The college has bodies like anti ragging committee, guidance cell, grievance redressal cell, career counseling cell etc. SC, SC and OBC cell monitors their scholarship issue. Stationery is provided to such students under government scheme. There is a book bank for ST students while library contains a large number of books to support them. Students participate in social, cultural and sports activities. Active guidance is provided for their higher studies according to this capability and temperament and some of them join university or other college for courses like M. Sc., B.Ed, B.P.Ed. etc. The institution has organized Alumni meet in 2014 in which many pass out students attended. It was discussed in the meeting how the institution can improve its teaching quality. This year also there is a planning to organize alumni meet very soon. Alumni meetings are conducted regularly by the responsible faculties.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college administration is transparent and proactive. The Principal of the institution have a great vision for taking the college to new heights. Under his leadership the strength of the college has increased from 400 to 1700 regular students and three new courses were introduced in last seven years. Addition of new courses like M.Com and B.Sc (Computer Science) is under process which is expected to be introduced in the coming session.

Construction of classrooms, laboratories, seminar hall etc is materialized as per the vision. The administration

is decentralized where various committees have been formed with senior faculties as coordinators.

In accordance with creating a good academic ambiance greater interaction between teacher and students is promoted through qualitative learning and career counseling with administrative transparency. The college pays attention to the feedback of students. Leadership is encouraged through student's union, NSS, Red Cross, sports and cultural activities. The IQAC cell has taken several measures to enhance its quality.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

For safety and social security of female students, special counselling by senior lady professors, girl's common room, exclusive toilets and CCTV camera etc. has been arranged. To prevent ragging in the campus, *Anti Ragging Committee* has also been constituted. A *Gender Equity Cell* has also been constituted in this college. 'Environmental Studies' is taught to the first year students of all streams during graduation. It is mandatory. Only solid waste is produced in the college which is thrown in the dustbins kept at various places in the college including verandah, staff room, office, laboratory, library etc. The waste is disposed regularly at a distant place in a pit. The water which is wasted while using water cooler is used by pouring it in the flower pots and plant. We don't face the problem of E- waste. Most popular mode of communication of the students of this college is public bus and bicycles. There are pedestrian friendly roads and pavements in this campus. Walking is preferred by both the students and faculties. The college has started cleanliness drive and plantation by the students. Planting saplings in flowerpots displaying their botanical as well as popular name on the pot has also been initiated. To enhance quality education the college has stated smart board education in teaching selectively. As per our vision students of this college are exposed to career counselling and training programmes regularly. General knowledge test is also held regularly.

1.1.1 Effective Curriculum Delivery

Being an affiliating college, the college has to follow and adhere to the prescribed syllabus approved and provided by Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur (Chhattisgarh). In order to ensure the curriculum delivery effectively our institution follows well designed and specific time table for all three faculties, M.A. and P.G.D.C.A. as well as D.C.A. in a logical and judicious way. Syllabus of every subject is divided into several units in general which is taught according to the approved time table within the stipulated framework. Since the delivery of designated syllabus is an important component of teaching learning progression, the focus on the delivery of syllabus in time is of utmost important for us. Well timed execution of teaching plan is always kept in mind. Since practical paper is common with the subject of Science and Geography, extra attention is required while completing the syllabus of these papers in fixed time. Laboratories of science subjects help students pursue their practical lessons. While teaching theoretical paper, each paper is divided into units which are further subdivided into well split lessons and every lesson is taught in well pondered duration or credit. Such split of syllabus at micro level teaching helps maintain completion of syllabus and academic progression in desired timeframe.

Recently we have started use of ICT in teaching also with the help of computers, smart board, projector, digital English lab, e library etc to deliver the Curriculum effectively.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

2.2.1 Advanced and slow learner

This college follows government norms in admission with neutrality. As a result, both advanced and slow learners get admission in the college. The institution is well aware of the fact that the students coming to the college for higher education are not of equal levels, some may be quick learner while some need special care and attention.

In the beginning a few introductory cum counseling classes are held by the concerned subject teacher to make the students aware of the demand of the subject. The College tries to bridge the knowledge gap of the students in various ways and thus enables the students to cope up with opted subjects. The teachers teach them even one on one whenever they ask for guidance in extra time separately during tutorial classes. Topic is simplified for them and writing properly in examination with the help of sketch, diagram, data and graph etc. are specially conveyed. To create interest interesting topics are taught in the beginning instead of complicated one.

Academically slow learners are identified by their performance in the class tests and internal assessment which is held regularly. The differences become clear after the first unit test. In order to bridge the knowledge gap the subject teachers keep a vigil on both types of students.

Special courses and enrichment programmes such as personality development, communication skill development etc. are also organized for such students.

The Students scoring good marks i.e. advance learners are motivated by special recognition and are encouraged to help such class fellows facing difficulties. They are exposed to reference books of the

library, e- learning materials and useful websites on related topics etc. They are made aware of various competitive examinations also to boost their professional career.

Internal test is conducted regularly and the students, who lag behind, are given special attention.

The students who belong to quick learner category are given responsibility to lead the class. Various competitions are also organized regularly in the college which provides greater exposure and helps them indirectly to gain confidence due to which they are motivated to participate in various events of the college and where the motivated students show their inherent talent. It also boosts learning confidence indirectly. In this way both the slow and fast learners are paid equal attention in the institution.

A digital English lab has been established from this session (2017-18) which would enable students particularly advanced learners to understanding the technicalities and phonetics of English language.

Department of commerce and science organizes PTM where parents are briefed about their ward and also in which way they can help them to concentrate on study.

Group based projects are being given in the chemistry & Commerce department where slow and advance learners together have been given task related to analytical, synthetic, and making of cosmetic products. Such project facilitates the tendency to work in a group and enables the slow Lerner to come out from their hesitation.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

2.3.1 Students Centric Method-

For enhancing the learning experiences various student centric methods has been designed as effective ways of grasping the desired knowledge.

Experiential learning method seeks the truth through personal and collective experience for which personal involvement is indispensable. Students are encouraged to share their perceived and real experience during classroom teaching related to that topic. Students are asked to perceive that class extends beyond the college where students get firsthand knowledge. Field trip or excursion is also a very powerful experiential learning method for the students of various disciplines. Last year Geography students of B.A. III year experienced urban and rural landscape and understood difference between them. The Commerce department takes its students to industrial and commercial sites. Science department takes its students to fields and sites to improve their knowledge about botanical plants and various insects and animals found in the field nearby the surrounding.

Participatory learning method- It requires participation of students as a seeker of scientific facts, natural laws or social theories wherein he or she tries to imbibe the theoretical knowledge into real life. Participation is either individual or collective and initially requires systematic training to understand the reality. Political Science department takes the students to the Vidhan Sabha every year during the Legislative Assembly session wherein students experience the proceedings directly, is an example of mute as well as collective participatory learning method. Student's participation is also visible in handmade poster, charts, model and power point presentation with the help of projector. Group discussion, role play and case study are also practiced.

Students give their presentation using power point in various departments (Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Commerce, Economics, Geography) to boost their confidence and understanding of that topic.

Problem solving method- Quite often students confront various problems in perceiving and understanding the intricacies of the topic in the classrooms. Such academic issues are resolved by the concerned teacher in the classroom through guidance in simple, lucid and uncomplicated language, citing various examples. Topic related problems of the students are solved with the help of reference books, website, hand notes, group discussions, seminar etc. Illustrating the topic through models, charts and experiments also solve classroom problems of the students. Sometimes lecture by an expert of other college are also organized. Specialized seminars and workshops have also been organized in this college.

Group based projects are also assigned to students of various departments on topics other than their syllabus to enrich their problem solving capacity.

Experimental Method- Experiments are integrated with the subjects of science as practical papers. The students of science are taught the topics with lot of practical experiments in physics, chemistry, botany and zoology. Such experiments and practices act as a foundation stone of their skill and knowledge and in shaping heir career. Practical paper has been included in geography syllabus also. To enhance the learning by experimental method department of chemistry has given some experimental projects apart from their syllabus on water and soil.

2.3.4: Innovation and creativity in teaching and learning:

With the induction of modern gadgets, classroom teaching in this college is blended with some innovative mode of teaching. Introduction of audio- visual equipments, power- point presentation and project making

with the help of internet on computer by the students has added new dimension in innovative and creative process of teaching- learning.

Now facility of E -library is also available for the students of this college which open a wide range of knowledge based choice in selecting and preparing their audio- visual presentation. Students of chemistry form group and prepare theme based joint audio- visual project.

In Political Science department map of the world is used in teaching Topics like international relations and global spread of developed and developing countries.

Creativity is expected from the students of Hindi literature of PG class especially in the field of writing emotions and feeling in a creative manner. For this purpose a wall magazine 'Srijan' fulfils their aspiration by providing them an innovative platform displaying poems, short stories, etc. both in Hindi and Chhattisgarhi.

The teachers of department of Hindi use India's map while teaching dialects of Hindi language spoken in different parts of India to make them understand the geographical dimensions of Hindi.

Topic based seminar and group discussions in classrooms are another dimensions of teaching--learning process. Poster and chart making on various themes by the students of different subjects also reveal creativity in their thought process. Creativity is also evident in slogan writing and wall painting of the students which are organized at different times during the cultural department of the college which reflect their creativity.

Students of Sociology department, after reading the cultural aspects of folk dance of local people, performed *Suva dance* in the college which revealed their creativity in translating the formal knowledge into teaching-learning process.

Department of Zoology have a aquarium in their laboratory which is being developed and taken care by the students, which helps the students to get practical knowledge and connection with their subject.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation System

Evaluation is an important process to measure the performance of the students. This college follows the evaluation system of Pt. Ravi Shankar Shukla University, Raipur. However, there is well established mechanism of internal evaluation to train the students since the examination pattern at college and university is quite different from that of the school level examination.

There is provision of unit test, quarterly examination, half yearly examination and pre-final examination which keep the students engaged in internal evaluation during their academic session. It trains them as an examinee of annual and or semester examination held by the university.

The progress of the students is monitored by the teachers through such tests, written assignments, oral tests, group discussions and interactive sessions.

A notice regarding the dates and timing of quarterly, half yearly, pre-final and practical exams are displayed on the notice board and the students gets informed ahead of it.

The department conducts exams and also collects the feedback from students and evaluates the quality of teaching learning process.

The students are encouraged to take these seemingly less important tests more seriously. After test they are shown their answer sheets and the comments of the evaluators by the concerned teachers. This process is repeated after every examination so that they can know about their mistakes and rectify accordingly to perform better in the future.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

2.5.2 Mechanism of Internal Assessment-

Evaluation is the integral part of teaching - learning process of this college with an objective of gradual refinement in the process of academic outcome. The mechanism of internal assessment of the students is quite logical and follows a coherent pattern.

- During first few lectures the students are made aware of annual examination pattern held by the university, and also the internal evaluation mechanism consisting of unit tests quarterly examination, half yearly examination, pre-final examination.
- Each department conducts unit test, and above said exams and also collects the feedback from students and evaluates the quality of teaching learning. There is a separate department to conduct these internal exams also like annual exams.
- The time table is finalized by the examination department. The date of examination is communicated orally in the classrooms and also displayed formally on the notice board.
- These exams are held in a formal manner to make the student familiar with university exams.
- Record of each student appearing in the exam is kept formally by the concerned subject teacher.
- The results are shown to the students, so that they can know about the shortcomings and refine their answer to perform better in the future, particular in final examination.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal examination grievance-

A crystal clear time table is displayed showing date and time of each class, subject and paper before the commencement of exams. If examinee has any grievance arising out during the process of internal assessment he or she is free to make point to subject teacher. The matter is resolved logically based on academic facts. Different subjects need different treatment in taking exams. For example, an examinee of Geography requires drawing maps and diagrams to support and supplement the answer. They are asked not to use stencil of India or the world; that only free hand drawing is allowed and considered best to fetch good marks.

Grievance may arise in disallowing scientific calculator in several papers of Commerce and Mathematics. To redress such grievance such information is provided to them before the commencement of exams. Such

steps reduces students grievance significantly.

If any grievance arises during the university exams regarding a question, the examinee is asked to complete the writing first and after finishing the exam write a letter to the registrar (exams) of the university and the related problem as well as the exact grievance.

If a dilemma occurs regarding the difference in the version of language, the students are asked to follow the English version instead of Hindi version and write a letter of your grievance pointing the matter to the registrar (exams) of the university after finishing the exam.

Such mechanism effectively deals with the grievances of the student during and after the exams.

The college follows the above academic calendar for the internal evaluation of the students of the college. internal evaluation schedule of the university is followed by the college every year but depending upon the situation the dates of Exam may vary.

Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The institution has adequate facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, etc.

Response:

4.1.1 Physical facilities for Teaching Learning –

Almost 25 years ago this college was started in a school building with quite inadequate facilities. However, when this institution was shifted to its own campus with a two storey building, and a play ground it started attracting students in large number. Fortunately it has added more facilities for teaching learning with the passage of time. Apart from original building and classrooms, new hall, lab and classrooms has been constructed and added to the Physical facilities for teaching learning process. In this academic session also 6 new classrooms were added. In this session we got a boundary wall around its campus also.

At present there are 16 classrooms, 8 laboratories, 1 computer room, 2 rooms fitted with smart board as a modern ICT technique, an English language lab, 1 examination cell, 1 staff room, 1 principal's room, 2 office rooms, 1 girl's common room, 1 sports ground and 2 vehicle stands. Apart from traditional podium, this college has an advanced podium fitted with sound system and light. The college has personal sound boxes, sound systems and LCD projectors also. There are 7 toilets separately both for Gents and Ladies, water cooler and girl's common room. There are 43 computers also in the institution. Physical facilities for teaching learning are increasing.

4.1.2 The institution has adequate facilities for sports, games (indoor, outdoor) gymnasium, yoga centre etc. and cultural activities

Response:

4.1.2 Physical facilities for Sports, Games and Cultural activities:

This institution has a large field for field and track events and outdoor games. In this session college got a boundary wall around this field. There are adequate facilities for sports and outdoor games like khokho, kabaddi, long jump, high jump, discuss throw, javelin throw, badminton, football etc. Indoor games like table tennis board, chess, carom board, are available. a gymnasium and a yoga centre is proposed in near future in our institution.

Students are encouraged to read English newspapers to improve their language proficiency. Library is automated with library management software named "LIBMAN" version 1.0 which is successfully implemented and circulation of books is now done through software. The library has taken the membership of N-List consortium for electronic journal and books since last two years. The students are not very techno savvy which is a challenge and obstacle in the usage of online journals and books. The librarian and the library staffs are now working towards spreading awareness regarding information available over internet. The library has a dedicated notice board where the newspaper cuttings of information which may be useful to the students as well as faculties are displayed. The process of scanning the last few years university question papers is on the process which will be made available to the students in the library. The process of bar-coding of books is going on right now.

In the changing academic scenario college planned to start new diploma courses to help the local students march with the technological front also as the computer education has become indispensable today. Considering this fact the college sought permission from the authority of Higher Education to sanction and allow teaching of *DCA* and *PGDCA* in 2014 and kept on follow- up to the authority for it. As a result we were allowed to start these two courses in the last academic session. In this way this college became able to started two diploma courses for the students, viz., DCA and PGDCA in 2016-17.
- 2. Likewise, taking into account the importance of English language, setting an *English Lab* was also mooted for advanced learners. Lingua franca of these students is Chhattisgarhi and Hindi but English plays a pivotal role in seeking job. So the need to have a digital English lab in the college was perceived as of utmost importance. Fund was a problem but with the assistance of district collector we could become able to establish it in current session (2017-18). - (vi) Constitution of career counseling cell was also mooted by IQAC. This cell regularly organizes lectures on personality development, on job related themes, quiz contest.
- (vii) IQAC also organized guest lectures by specialist resource persons on several topics on NAAC also.
- (viii) Paper cutting and its display on notice board

- 1. It was decided to organize seminar, workshop and theme based guest lecture by invited guest lecturers in the IQAC meeting of 2014.
- (i) With this thought Department of Geography organized a national seminar with the assistance of UGC, CRO, Bhopal. Theme of the seminar was 'Retrospect and Prospect of Rural Development in India: With Special Reference to Chhattisgarh' It was held on 25th and 16th November, 2014. About 180 participants attended it.
- (ii) In 2016 two day workshop was organized by the Sports Department under the aegis of UGC, CRO, Bhopal. Theme of the workshop was 'Training Method for Competitive Sports' held on 15th and 16th January, 2016.
- (iii) In this academic session a two day nation seminar is being organized in this college jointly by the Chemistry Department and Botany Department under the aegis of Chhattisgarh Council of Science and Technology (CGCOST). Theme of the seminar is 'Environmental Conservation and Sustainable Development Chhattisgarh'. It was held on 16th and 17th January 2018.
- 2. Realizing the changing academic scenario of higher education enhancement of computer literacy was accepted by the IQAC and so it was decided to start new diploma courses in computer education. In the

6.5.2- Review of Teaching Learning Process, Structure and Methodologies of operation and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC setup-
Teaching learning process is reviewed by IQAC at regular interval under the aegis of principal. Main purpose of such review is to evaluate and analyse the implementation of monthly teaching plan and the execution of timetable properly in thought and spirit. The focus is to follow the monthly teaching plan and complete the prescribed course in time.
The process of teaching learning is well structured and implemented in the classroom through regular teaching by subject teachers. Structure wise each paper of every subject is divided into units concentrating on special group of lessons. Such structure is academic and pre-planned logically, leading a student to acquire the knowledge of the subject gradually, systematically and logically.
Methodologies of operation of teaching learning is well defined in this college including classroom teaching and completion of syllabus, organizing unit test and sessional test at regular interval in order to make the students prepared for the final exam.
Result of classroom or unit tests of the students are reviewed properly by the concerned teachers and to bridge the gap of understanding extra classes are held. In this way IQAC operates and intervenes in the teaching learning process and tries to implement positive changes to overcome barrier of learning.

7.1.1 Gender Equity

Gender equity is the most desirable aspect of civilized society which is very challenging in a world full of socio- economic and gender inequality and discrimination. That's why we need to be pro- active in this regard. Keeping this fact in mind, this institution deliberately executed gender sensitivity in providing facilities like safety and social security, special counseling for the girl students, arrangement of girl's common room, toilets and CCTV camera etc.

For safety and social security, CCTV cameras have been installed at 9 points in this college with the purpose of monitoring the movements of students in general and keep vigil on the safety of female students in particular. Installation of these cameras has psychologically affected the behavior of the male students making them more sensitive and responsible while interacting with their female counterparts.

There are two separate toilets on the first floor of the college in the main building. One more separate toilet has been constructed for female students in the new building also. There is a separate common room for the girl students where they can rest, refresh and spend leisure peacefully.

7.1.2 Environmental Consciousness and Sustainability- Environmental degradation has been phenomenal in recent past due to anthropogenic activity and there is question mark on the sustainability of our lifestyle. To appraise the significance of environment and sustainability a paper called '*Environmental Studies*' is taught to the first year students of all streams during graduation. It is mandatory. They are directly and indirectly asked and encouraged to use bicycle and public transport, save water, energy, electricity in campus etc. at home, avoid use of plastic materials in life and use traditional cloth bags instead of polythene carry bags, and use of dustbins to throw garbage properly in the college.

Waste Management- Only solid waste is produced in the college which is thrown in the dustbins kept at various places in the college including verandah, staff room, office, laboratory, library etc. The waste is disposed regularly at a distant place in a pit. The water which is wasted while using water cooler is used by pouring it in the flower pots and plant. We don't face the problem of E- waste.

Apart from gaining knowledge, today students come for higher education to achieve a good career. Our institution understands the student's requirement very well and continuously working to add new dimension in teaching and learning. All the faculties have unique and different strategies to do this job. In Arts faculty the students are encouraged to do projects with the assistance of teachers. Apart from this as the students are from rural background the awareness regarding various employment opportunities are very less. The faculties convey and assist them in selecting their career. In Science and Commerce faculty the teachers maintain wall magazines through which the students are given latest information related to career, updating knowledge related to subject. During teaching the faculties make the students aware regarding various employment opportunities in their subject field as well as regarding the competitive examination. The college has an active career councelling cell which is working throughout the year by organizing lectures about motivation, subject and regarding career opportunities. The cell conducts G.K test regularly which is highly appreciated and large number of students appear in the test. The college is selected by the Government of Chhattisgarh for running its highly ambitious program 'Mukshya Mantri Swavlamban Yojna' (MYSY). Students are selected based on the examination conducted by the authorized agency. The selected students are given 45 days training which covers almost all area of competitive examination like English, Reasoning, Maths, etc. As the classes are conducted by specialized people students found this training very useful. The agency conducts placement drive after completion of training. A good number of students got placement opportunities through this platform. This year the college has developed English Language Lab with an added vision to make students more confident to face the outside world through good spoken English which is very essential now a day. Most of the students are from rural background with a weak base of English which has a huge impact on their confidence level. This will definitely help

them a lot in their career. The college faculties and staffs are working hard to achieve the vision of the institution through continuous and systematic efforts so that the students could design their personality in a specialized manner and excel in their personal and professional life and sustain their family viably and serve the society and the nation in a positive way.

5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information:

The geographical location of the college is definitely an attraction from the local community, as it is on the national highway and commuting to the college is easy due to the availability of local bus in every five minutes. The result can be seen with a wonderful ratio of girl and boy students, which is ultimately helpful for educating girls of nearby villages. Students are tried to be given maximum exposure possible, where they are taken for field trips, programs, competitions organized by other colleges. Many times students won prizes in such competitions like group dance, debate, essay etc. One student also won first prize in state level competition in essay from M.A (Hindi) A few College students were fortunate and privileged that some sportsman and athletes of this college got a chance to see international hockey match held in Raipur. The sports officer tries hard from his side to send the competent students to interuniversity, interstate, inter-zone competitions and many students have benefitted. Many students have got government jobs on sports quota also.

Most of the student of the college are from rural background and their lingua franka is Chhattisgarhi and they are not comfortable with English language and also Internet and E-Mail. Though the college is putting all efforts to make them used to these advance technology.

Concluding Remarks:

Almost all of the students are of rural background and quite often they come from their fields and farms to attend the class. So credit goes to them that they work and also read. The college was started in the premise of a school but now it has good physical infrastructure. Now we have got a boundary wall also around the campus. The number of the students has also increased many folds. Installation of Wi-Fi, automation of library and establishment of English lab recently has started providing it a futuristic shape. Acquisition of synthetic mat for the players of kabaddi is another example of marching with the time in desired direction.

The college faculties put lots of efforts for improving the teaching standard of the students, as it is found that their knowledge base at the time of admission is not satisfactory and most of the students due to their background are introvert and shy. So teachers take extra care to improve their confidence level by conducting various classroom activities as well as conducting various competitions regularly. Nonetheless, considering the number of enrolled students, this college needs more teaching faculties as well as non- teaching staffs for the better functioning of this college.

With a big responsibility of nurturing more than 1700 regular student's future, the college administration and faculties are working all year around. Definitely the college has played a significant role in shaping the life of students and will always be dedicated to this purpose.
